Henry Waxman Robert Weissman As you know, § 1-301(d) of the Environment Article requires the Department of the Environment to produce an annual report on its enforcement activities by October 1 each year. This requirement was created by SB 324 of 1997, sponsored by then-Senator Brian Frosh, and signed into law by Governor Parris Glendening. Colloquially known as the "Frosh Report," the fiscal 2015 report due to be submitted to the Legislative Policy Committee of the Maryland General Assembly and the public is now nearly three months late.

As we approach important deadlines for compliance with the Chesapeake Bay Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL), the importance of vigilant inspections and robust enforcement by the Department of the Environment comes into sharp relief. The Frosh Report is a crucial transparency tool allowing the public to track progress toward achieving the Bay TMDL and other pollution reduction efforts. We hope you will issue the report at your earliest convenience.
