We are writing to express dismay about your decision to co-sponsor a conference with the Chamber of Commerce regarding "incorporation by reference" in the international arena. This decision conflicts with the mission of ACUS in two

First and foremost, the Chamber is in the forefront of an intense campaign to discredit regulation and should not be a "partner" with ACUS in any context if you wish to preserve your organization's stature as "an independent federal agency dedicated to improving the administrative process through consensus-driven applied research, providing nonpartisan expert advice and recommendations for improvement of federal agency procedures." (This language is taken from your website.)



Second, the agenda for the conference indicates unmitigated support for the notion that voluntary industry "consensus" standards can and should supplant efforts by governments to write their own rules to protect public health, worker and consumer safety, and the environment. I understand that you may well view the so-called "IBR" issue as a highly technical one that does not raise substantive issues. We respectfully disagree with this perception. In the international context, the United States has been under heavy pressure to dilute its regulatory approach to health and safety on the grounds that strong protections are in reality a barrier to trade that is illegal under GATT. As disturbing, the hollowing out of government in the United States has increased the pressure to adopt industry standards in lieu of doing the independent work to determine how best to prevent the catastrophes that increasingly plague us—from the Deepwater Horizon explosion, to the Upper Big Branch mine collapse, to the shipment of peanut paste contaminated by salmonella.

We urge you to reconsider how ACUS presents itself publicly. Especially in this early period of its rebirth, the organization cannot afford to be perceived as taking sides in the enormously destructive crusade against regulation that the Chamber and other powerful industry groups are leading.

Thank you for considering these views.
